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Description

The Canadian Studies Program focuses on an awareness and analysis of Canadian stories. “Stories” can be considered literally, as in the study of Canadian authors, directors and artists. But they can also be considered politically, an investigation of how society is organized and who has power. In this respect, the stories of the marginal are no less critical to understanding Canada than is knowledge of Canadian civics. Moreover, Canadian Studies considers the land itself; the Earth tells its own stories in the composition of the rock, the biodiversity of our forests, oceans and tundra and in the patterns of city and country living. Finally, the program is concerned with how Canadian stories are used to persuade us—only by understanding media and the techniques of propaganda can we defend ourselves against manipulation by corporations, special interests and politicians and seek a better Canada.

As an interdisciplinary program, York University’s Canadian Studies Program allows students to study with an impressive concentration of outstanding scholars, making connections between different fields of knowledge in the Humanities, Communications, Social, Physical and Environmental Sciences and the Fine Arts. Using this breadth, the Canadian Studies Major can engage in their community at the local, regional and national levels and will be well-able to devise solutions to the problems of a 21st century Canada. Graduates can expect to become familiar with Canadian issues in a wide variety of contexts, including Canadian-American relations, Literature, Canada’s First Nations, the Environment, Media and Culture, Social Justice, Political Science and Canadian Identity.

As the pace of globalization increases, employers in both national and international contexts will be looking to hire those with knowledge of resource-rich Canada. But more than this, a Canadian Studies degree makes for more successful citizens. With this degree, the Canadian studies graduate is well able to devise strategies to help a given campaign, promotion or cause succeed in a *Canadian* context, because they are familiar with that context. They know how to make the initiatives of a company, charity or organization fit with prevailing Canadian ideologies, government priorities and society in general. And they know how to engage with political, economic and social problems (and successes) that are uniquely our own.

Why choose this program?

- Learn to understand the basic stories of Canadian society, how they are told, and their effect on mass audiences and public policy.
- Gain an understanding of the diverse and contested ideas of what it means to be "Canadian".
- Learn to interpret the many ways in which people experience Canada and what those experiences mean in terms of Canadian history, culture, economics and politics.
- Explore ideas and issues that are rooted in the past and uncover how they are relevant to Canada's international role today.

PROGRAM REQUIREMENTS:

Note: *with prior permission of the program coordinator, courses with Canadian content that are not listed in this calendar may be counted for major credit.*

For purposes of meeting program requirements, all nine-credit general education (foundation) courses will count as six credits towards the major or minor.

SPECIALIZED HONOURS BA:

Residency requirement: A minimum of 30 course credits and at least half (50 per cent) of the course credits required in each undergraduate degree program major/minor must be taken at York University.

Graduation requirement: Students must successfully complete (pass) at least 120 credits which meet the Faculty's degree and program requirements with a cumulative grade point average of at least 5.00.

NEW General Education Requirements for FW2014: For all degree types offered by the Faculty of Liberal Arts and Professional Studies, students must take a minimum of 21 General Education credits from the approved list of LA&PS General Education courses as follows:

- 6.00 credits in Natural Science (NATS)
- A 9.00 credit approved General Education course in the social science or humanities categories
- A 6.00 credit approved General Education course in the opposite category to the 9.00 credit course in social science or humanities already taken.

Major credits: 54 credits including:

- i. AP/CDNS 2200 6.00/HUMA 2200 6.00 Introduction to Canadian Studies
- ii. At least six credits from each of the three key areas of courses with Canadian content provided below.
- iii. The balance of the 54 credits must come from the three lists mentioned in (ii) with the additional Canadian studies courses also listed below.

Note: at least 12 credits in the major must be completed at the 4000 level.

Upper-level credits: at least 36 credits at the 3000 or 4000 level, including at least 18 credits at the 4000 level.

Credits outside the major: at least 18 credits.

HONOURS BA:

Residency requirement: A minimum of 30 course credits and at least half (50 per cent) of the course credits required in each undergraduate degree program major/minor must be taken at York University.

Graduation requirement: Students must successfully complete (pass) at least 120 credits which meet the Faculty's degree and program requirements with a cumulative grade point average of at least 5.00.

NEW General Education Requirements for FW2014: For all degree types offered by the Faculty of Liberal Arts and Professional Studies, students must take a minimum of 21 General Education credits from the approved list of LA&PS General Education courses as follows:

- 6.00 credits in Natural Science (NATS)
- A 9.00 credit approved General Education course in the social science or humanities categories
- A 6.00 credit approved General Education course in the opposite category to the 9.00 credit course in social science or humanities already taken.

Note: at least 12 credits in the major must be completed at the 4000 level.

Upper-level credits: at least 36 credits at the 3000 or 4000 level, including at least 18 credits at the 4000 level.

Credits outside the major: at least 18 credits.

Note: students who are completing a double major or major/minor are deemed to have fulfilled this requirement.

HONOURS DOUBLE MAJOR BA:

The Honours BA program described above may be pursued jointly with approved Honours Double Major degree programs in the Faculties of Environmental Studies, Fine Arts, Health, Liberal Arts and Professional Studies, Science or the Lassonde School of Engineering.

Note: in a double major program, a course may count only once toward major credit.

HONOURS MAJOR/MINOR BA:

The Honours BA program described above may be pursued jointly with approved Honours Minor degree programs in the Faculties of Environmental Studies, Fine Arts, Health, Liberal Arts and Professional Studies, Science or the Lassonde School of Engineering.

HONOURS MINOR BA:

ORDINARY BA:

Residency requirement: A minimum of 30 course credits and at least half (50 per cent) of the course credits required in each undergraduate degree program major/minor must be taken at York University.

Graduation requirement: Students must successfully complete (pass) at least 90 credits that meet the Faculty's degree and program requirements with a cumulative grade point average of at least 4.00.

NEW General Education Requirements for FW2014: For all degree types offered by the Faculty of Liberal Arts and Professional Studies, students must take a minimum of 21 General Education credits from the approved list of LA&PS General Education courses as follows:

- 6.00 credits in Natural Science (NATS)
- A 9.00 credit approved General Education course in the social science or humanities categories
- A 6.00 credit approved General Education course in the opposite category to the 9.00 credit course in social science or humanities already taken.

Major: 30 credits including:

- ii. At least six credits from each of the three key areas of courses with Canadian content provided below.

Note: at least 12 credits in the major must be completed at the 3000 level or above.

Upper-level credits: the 90 credits above must include at least 18 credits at the 3000 level or above.

Credits outside the major: at least 18 credits.

KEY AREAS OF COURSES/STUDY:

- **Canada: Environment (Time, Place and Space)** Focuses on interdisciplinary and international issues such as Canadian Aboriginal history, Canadian Geography and the Environment, and the immigrant experience.
- **Canada: Society** Examines various aspects of Canadian society through courses in history, Indigenous Thought, political science, sociology and social science.
- **Canada: Culture** Concentrates on the areas of English, Indigeneity, creative arts, cultural expression and the humanities.

Please note the following:

While a course may appear in more than one list, it may only be counted towards **ONE** of the required areas of study.

Students must take courses from at least three different subject areas to receive this degree (e.g. CDNS and two other subjects).

CDNS Majors/Minors are not guaranteed access to the courses from the three key areas of study. Students must meet the necessary prerequisites in order to enroll. Entrance to these courses is controlled by their respective academic units.

Not all of the courses listed below will necessarily be offered in any given year.
